A sustainable approach to dialogue across the Anna Lindh Foundation network

Dialogue efforts often face barriers due to unclear concepts, lack of active listening, lack of documented memory and avoidance of disagreement.

A Transformative Approach for Dialogue

- Can be implemented across the entire Anna Lindh
 Foundation network
- Offers a sustainable model for uniting diverse actors in dialogue Supports a more coherent, inclusive approach to intercultural understanding
- Requires initial support from European institutions and local actors
- Aims to build momentum for a transformative and lasting dialogue strategy

Why Addressing Ideological Narratives Is Urgent

- Fuelled massive misinformation and disinformation
- Led to one-sided focus on suffering
- **M** Trust erosion
- Resulted in deepening polarization
- Root cause of conflict and civilian casualties
- Dialogue for Peace
- **M** Recognizing Patterns

Dialogue Across Borders

• Founded in 2007–2008 with ALF support

• Launched by HRH Prince El Hassan bin Talal

• Many initiatives since, but often fragmented

• Listening to voices from the Arab world

Investigative reporting close to location and time

Accuracy in presenting the views of others

Working with student interns from all over the world

Dialogue Across Borders Database now holds
 50,000+ articles & reports

• Our method: be as close as possible in time & place



Dialogue Across Borders: A Foundation for Sustainable Dialogue

Do not let the war divide us — fight for an effective dialogue for a lasting peace.

Religion, Misinformation & Dialogue

- Many in the West have turned away from religion, but remains central in the Middle East
- Religion often claims absolute truth, used by leaders to mobilize for political objectives
- This can fuel misinformation & disinformation

Misinformation:

Shared by those who believe it's true

Disinformation:

Deliberate, partisan, intended to mislead

Do not let the war divide us — fight for an effective dialogue for a lasting peace.

Religion, Misinformation & Dialogue

- Detecting intention is difficult; accusing without evidence is counterproductive
- Our approach: focus on detail & context to identify probable intentions
- Dialogue Across Borders proves sensitive topics
 can be addressed

Misinformation:

Shared by those who believe it's true

Disinformation:

Deliberate, partisan, intended to mislead

• A Fieldwork Example: Religion, Visibility & Misinformation in Egypt Marinab Village, 2011

• Christians had prayed quietly for years in a simple building

 Some Muslims upset by change to the village's public image

 Anger was triggered by unauthorized construction of a public religious building

• The core issue: changing public identity of a Muslim-majority village

Fieldwork Example: Religion, Visibility & Misinformation in Marinab Village, Egypt

From Village Conflict to Global Outrage

- Video of burning church went viral without context
- Coptic activists abroad framed it as persecution
- Western media amplified without verifying details
- Anger/demonstration fueled by <u>emotion</u> and unverified knowledge
- <u>Army vehicle drove into crowd, likely in panic</u>
- Global Islamophobic media ran with the images


Key Takeaways from Marinab

Visibility and identity are sensitive issues tied to religion

• Misinformation travels faster than facts

• Emotions + media gaps = deadly consequences

• Grounded, informed dialogue is essential




A Case Study: Religion, Visibility & Misinformation in Marinab Village, Egypt

"A Tool for Truth, Peace & Mutual Understanding"

50+ Years of Field-Based Dialogue & Research

- Work began in 1974 with the Werkgroep Midden-Oosten with students
- Advocated Israeli-Palestinian dialogue & two-state solution
- Involved with Christian refugees from Turkey & Syria; contrasting narratives
- Since 1994: Investigated Western media reporting on persecution of Christians
- Monitored Egyptian media on religion
- Found religious/political advocacy distorting facts
- Responded with fact-checked, multiperspective reports



From Method to Impact

- Face profound disagreements
- Train students using the database as a tool
 - → reduce database costs
- Opportunities for youth to express different voices
- Work is not theoretical
- Producing practical results in Egypt

DIALOGUE ACROSS BORDERS

Abu Fana Case – Media vs. Reality

- 2008: 3 monks briefly kidnapped and beaten
- Framed internationally as a Muslim-Christian conflict
- Coverage by New York Times based on limited facts
- Monks emphasized religious framing to gain sympathy
- Few journalists visited or investigated deeply (stayed distant)
- Root cause: land conflict, not religious tension
- Our reporting led to formal land border agreement



A Case Study: The Abu Fana Incident: A Misleading Narrative

Understanding and Challenging Christian Zionist Views

- Christian Zionists support West Bank & Gaza annexation on religious grounds
- Tremendous political influence in the USA
- Engaged in dialogue with Karin Anderson to understand her arguments
- Editor collected texts documenting her views with her approval, then challenged them
- Non-partisan, non-normative approach, not linked to any religious or political entity
- All impactful voices presented without censorship; critique invited
- Results available in our database

Lessons Learned

Key Takeaways

• Misinformation spreads fast—must counter it using our database

• Our database provides relevant context and reveals patterns quickly

 Credibility is key—used in several PhD studies

• Dr. Elsässer: Arab-West Report (Dialogue Accross Borders) is "one of the most valuable sources"

 Scholars often rely on biased written sources—our fieldwork fills that gap

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The Need for a Manual to Fight Mis/Disinformation

- The Anna Lindh Foundation pilot "The Road to Inclusive Narratives" stresses the need for a structured manual
- Need for a manual = actionable strategies & tools for organizations
- 19 years of student dialogue training = solid foundation for this manual
- Manual can train youth as "Ambassadors for Peace"
- Plans are in the making but we require support

Importance of Oral History


- Cultural differences fuel mis/disinformation
 - → Arab honor/shame culture vs.
 Western text-focus
- Oral info is volatile, often ignored in the West
- We risk misinterpretation by viewing events only through our own lens
- Database building needed to capture different views
- University students can contribute, uncovering complexities



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Universities Must Step In

- Role of religion in society not just for theologians → needs social sciences too
- Universities should offer cross-multidisciplinary studies
 & collaborative research
- Encourage real-world projects exploring religion's place in society
- Foster critical thinking, empathy, & practical engagement
- Students can become ambassadors for peace
- Motivate action by offering academic credit
